

**STUDENT FELLOWS
AT THE CENTER FOR THE HUMANITIES
FALL 2004**

The Center for the Humanities invites applications from students in their junior year interested in participating as Student Fellows in the Fall 2004 Faculty Seminar directed by four Distinguished Visiting Professors in the Humanities. Up to five students will be selected as Fellows to join a working group of faculty and the visiting professors who will meet weekly to discuss selected readings on the seminar theme "Feminist Scholarship Today." The seminar will meet Wednesdays from 4:15-6:00 p.m. Student Fellows will also be invited to a weekly lunch of seminar participants on Fridays.

Seminar Theme: Feminist Scholarship Today

Sept. 6 - Sept. 24 – Professor Kristin Ross (French and Comparative Literature, New York University): In this seminar we will attempt to historicize the conflict between the United States and "old Europe" (especially France) by revisiting some of the earlier postwar themes and moments of ideological disagreement (the postwar modernization of France, "thirdworldism," the French 1960s). We will conclude with recent French critiques of the U.S. by philosophers politicized in the 1960s. Readings will be drawn from Ross's two books *Fast Cars, Clean Bodies: Decolonization and The Reordering of French Culture* and *May '68 and Its Afterlives*.

Sept 27-Oct 15 – Professor Susan Bordo (English and Women's Studies, University of Kentucky): "Gender, Culture, and Popular Media": Each week, we will focus on a different topic and its portrayal in film and television. Possible topics might include: Changing Images of Fatherhood (*Father of the Bride* to *Kramer Versus Kramer* to *The Sopranos* and *Road to Perdition*), Adoption Narratives (not just adult movies, but also children's movies like *Stuart Little*), "Post-Modern" Hollywood (e.g., *The Truman Show*, *American Beauty*, *Far From Heaven*), Changing Images of Female Power (from Bette Davis to *Blue Crush*), The "Queering" of Popular Culture.

Oct. 25 - Nov. 12 – Professor Amy Hollywood (History of Christianity and Theology, University of Chicago): "Religion and Feminist Theory": We will focus on the interrelationship between feminist studies and the study of religion. In particular, we will examine the extent to which work on religion offers insight into issues of crucial concern to feminist studies, feminist theory, and feminist politics. Readings will be drawn from the work of Ulrike Strasser (on gender and Early Modern Catholicism), Saba Mahmood (on feminism and Islam), and Hollywood's *Sensible Ecstasy: Mysticism, Sexual Difference, and the Demands of History*.

Nov. 22 - Dec. 10 – Professor Rosi Braidotti (Women's Studies and Philosophy, University of Utrecht): Three topics will be explored in successive weeks: "Critical theory as cartography": uniting ideas drawn from Foucault, Jameson, and Deleuze with basic tenets of feminist philosophy concerning the politics of location, or situated knowledges; "Poststructuralist ethics and the issue of universalist values"; and "The question of Europe as philosophy": examination of the idea of the non-unitary subject in a poly-lingual and multicultural European context that expands in the direction of "flexible" forms of citizenship in the European Union as a post-nationalist social space.

Eligibility:

Students interested in becoming Student Fellows at the Center for the Humanities can have majors in any department. All applicants must have an overall GPA of 3.5 or higher and must be able to attend the weekly meetings. Students will not receive credit for their participation and no formal writing assignments will be required. Students will be encouraged to think about how their work during the semester might be developed into a MAP during the Spring semester.

Application Procedure:

To apply to be a Student Fellow at the Center for the Humanities, interested junior students should submit the following:

- A statement of their interest in the topic of the Seminar (no more than 750 words)
 - A transcript of their coursework at Grinnell
 - Names of two faculty references
